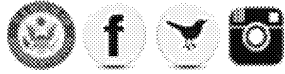

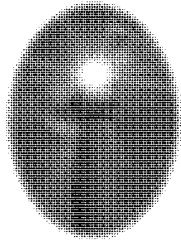

Good evening,

In December 2022, guidance was issued regarding notification requirements whenever an individual with an approved travel authorization under Uniting for Ukraine (U4U) is processed for any disposition other than Ukrainian Humanitarian Parole (UHP) or an approved travel authorization under the DHS established parole process for Venezuela is processed for any disposition other than Venezuelan Humanitarian Parole (VHP) at a Port of Entry (POE).

On January 5, 2023, DHS announced parole processes similar to that established for Venezuela for nationals of Cuba, Haiti, and Nicaragua. These processes are collectively referred to as the parole processes for Cuba, Haiti, Nicaragua, and Venezuela (CHNV) or the Advance Travel Authorization (ATA) processes.

The same notification requirements previously established for U4U and the parole process for Venezuelans are now required whenever an individual with an approved travel authorization under the DHS established parole process for Cuba is processed for any disposition other than Cuban Humanitarian Parole (CHP), an individual with an approved travel authorization under the DHS established parole process for Haiti is processed for any disposition other than Haitian Humanitarian Parole (HHP), or an individual with an approved travel authorization under the DHS established parole process for Nicaragua is processed for any disposition other than Nicaraguan Humanitarian Parole (NHP) at a POE. Please advise locations within your area of responsibility regarding this need for notification and ensure that such notifications are made to Field Liaison at (b)(7)(E)@cbp.dhs.gov, SEAL at (b)(7)(E)@cbp.dhs.gov, and EPD at (b)(7)(E)@cbp.dhs.gov.

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Dear Director (b)(6), (b)(7)(C):

I am writing to see if you have any updates regarding the parole requests that I submitted on October 27, 2021 for (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (DOB: (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)), (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (DOB: (b)(6), (b)(7)(C))), and their immediate family members.

This case is particularly urgent because the family will likely suffer great bodily harm and even death if they are denied access to seek asylum in the United States. All members of this family are Mexican nationals who are actively being persecuted in Mexico. On September 2, 2021, after years of ongoing persecution, members of the Jalisco New Generation Cartel violently murdered (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) mother (b)(6), (b)(7)(C). The cartel members claimed responsibility by sending the family a graphic video recording of the murder. This video evidence is available for your review upon request.

Since (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was murdered, threats against the entire family have escalated (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and their immediate family members are in danger of suffering great bodily harm or even death by the Jalisco New Generation Cartel members who are actively searching for them. This family is not safe in Mexico.

We respectfully urge that our requests for humanitarian parole be granted so this family can seek protection in the United States.

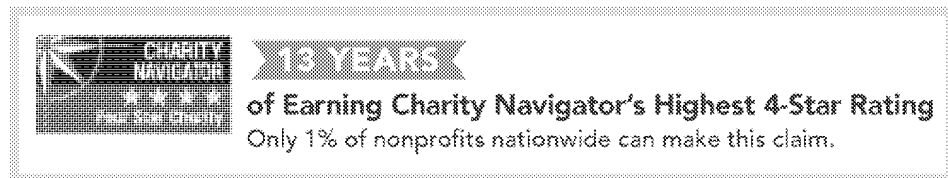

Dear Director: (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)

Siblings (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)) are seeking asylum in the United States together with their immediate family members. This extended family is comprised of **Mexican nationals whose lives are in imminent danger**. They are targeted victims of persecution by two opposing organized criminal groups from Michoacan, Mexico – the Correa Cartel and the Jalisco New Generation Cartel (CJNG). While the family has repeatedly reported extortion and threats from these groups over the years, the Mexican police have failed to protect them. Several years of persecution culminated just a few weeks ago when on **September 2, 2021**, members of the (CJNG) cartel acted on their violent threats by **brutally murdering** (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) mother, (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was **kidnapped and was fatally shot in the head by CJNG cartel members, see death certificate attached**. Since the murder of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) threats against the entire family have **escalated**.

This family has suffered extreme persecution in Mexico and they currently face imminent danger in Mexico. The power of the cartels in Mexico is pervasive throughout the entire country. The cartels work in conjunction with corrupt Mexican government officials to achieve violent control. Therefore, relocation within Mexico is not possible. The Mexican government is clearly not willing or able to protect this family from further harm. Research shows how the complicity of the Mexican government with organized crime leads to innocent civilians, like this family, suffering persecution without possibility for just recourse within Mexico. This family has no choice but to seek international protection from persecution.

Seeking asylum is a human right recognized in both U.S. and international law (1951 Refugee Convention, Article 14 Universal Declaration of Human Rights). According to **section 212(d)(5)(A) of the Immigration and Nationality Act**, the Department of Homeland Security has authority to grant parole for urgent humanitarian reasons or significant public benefit. Because every member of this family is a Mexican National who is actively facing persecution in Mexico and because humanitarian parole is their only way to seek asylum in the United States at this time, **to deny this family humanitarian parole would be to violate the principle of non-refoulement codified in both United States and international law.**

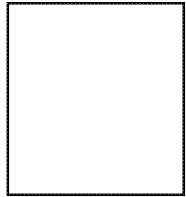

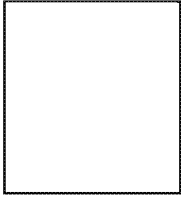

Indeed, violence against LGBT people has actually increased, with transgender women bearing the brunt of this escalation. Changes in the laws have made the LGBT communities more visible to the public and more vulnerable to homophobic and transphobic violence. Increased visibility has actually increased public misperceptions and false stereotypes about the gay and transgender communities. This has produced fears about these communities, such as that being gay or transgender is "contagious" or that all transgender individuals are HIV positive. These fears have in turn led to hate crimes and murders of LGBT people, particularly transgender women. (Report included in attached documentation).

Good evening,

I'm writing to request a reconsideration of the denial of (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)'s request for an exemption to Title 42. These individuals are gay and transgender and suffering unnecessarily in Mexico after fleeing for their lives from Jamaica. The law allows, and morality requires, that they be allowed to enter the United States, seek treatment, and access an asylum process.

Highlights:

- (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) has not had access to (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) in over 6 months. She has (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6) states in Exhibit B that there (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)
- (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) is experiencing (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) from the trauma in Jamaica, stress of lack of medical care, uncertainty of being in Mexico, and fear of deportation (b)(6) outlines this in Exhibit C.
- (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) Both of their visas have expired, and they have been harassed on the street by the public and by Tijuana state officials. They sit in their small room all day because they are now scared to go outside. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) has stated (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)
 - Should they be stopped without a visa they would be placed in detention and deported to Jamaica. Both live in fear of this possibility.
- (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (in particular) is being harassed and threatened with deportation by Mexican authorities. His bag was gone through and all of his stuff and little money was stolen. He has been told by the police that if they stop him without his visa (which is now expired) he will be arrested.

I did a wellness check on these two over the weekend and their situation is dire. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) could not hardly get up to greet me and (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was having a hard time expressing himself other than to say that he was really struggling mentally with being locked in scared.

I'm asking for a reconsideration of this parole/humanitarian exemption.

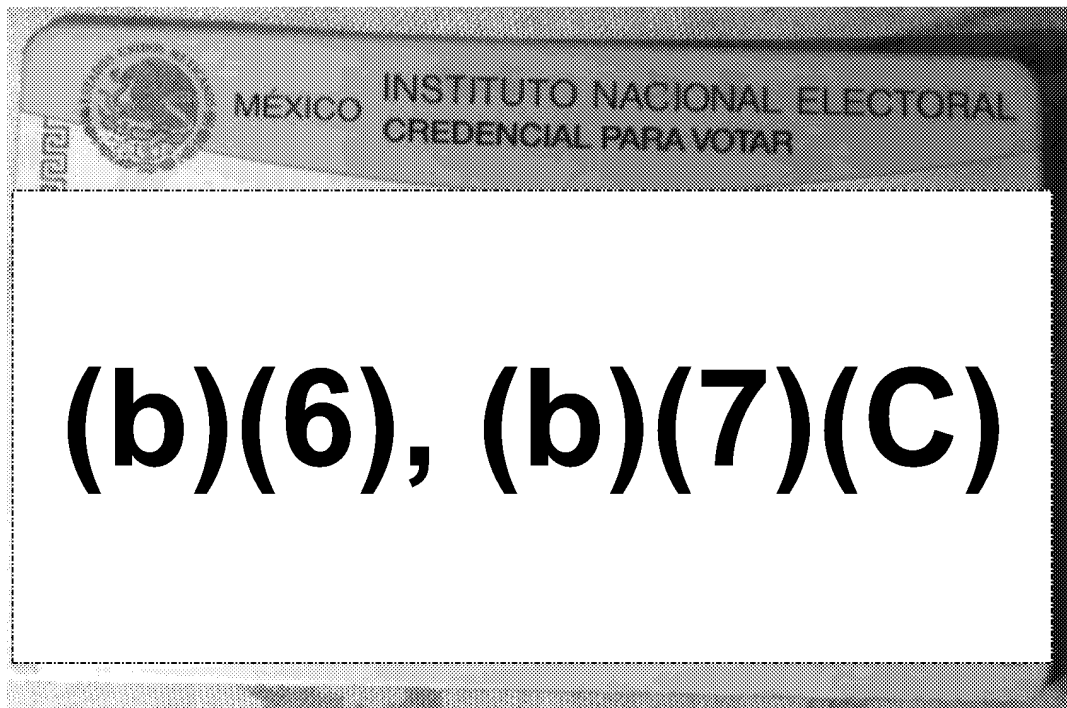

SUBJECT: Title 42 Exceptions for Ukrainian Nationals

U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP), Office of Field Operations (OFO) is currently assisting the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in enforcing its *Order Suspending the Right to Introduce Certain Persons from Countries Where a Quarantinable Communicable Disease Exists* under Sections 362 & 365 of the Public Health Service Act, 42 U.S.C. § 265 & 268, hereafter referred to as "Title 42."

The Department of Homeland Security recognizes that the unjustified Russian war of aggression in Ukraine has created a humanitarian crisis. CBP is authorized, consistent with the Title 42 Order, on a case-by-case basis based on the totality of the circumstances, including considerations of humanitarian interests, to except Ukrainian nationals at land border ports of entry from Title 42. Non-citizens who are in possession of a valid Ukrainian passport or other valid Ukrainian identity document, and absent risk factors associated with national security or public safety, may be considered for exception from Title 42 under this guidance.

Ukrainian non-citizens granted an exception from Title 42 may be processed for any disposition under Title 8, as appropriate, including urgent port of entry humanitarian parole on a case-by-case basis.

Situational Awareness: On February 15, 2023, at approximately 0526 hours (MST), an unidentified male arrived at the (b)(7)(E) pedestrian crossing carrying an eight year old male identified as (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (DOB: (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)) who was presented as a United States citizen requesting medical attention.

Supervisor was requested and advised of the situation.

An ambulance was requested on behalf of the child's medical needs and upon arrival, the ambulance EMTs advised the child needed to be transported to the hospital immediately.

As citizenship had not been confirmed at the time due to no documentation available, a CBP officer accompanied the child until determination of citizenship could be made.

Contact was made with uncle (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) who verbally confirmed the child was born in Phoenix and has been treated in Holy Cross Hospital in the past. (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) also confirmed that due to his and the grandmother's undocumented status, they requested a family friend to bring (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to the International Border to request medical assistance.

Medical staff at Holy Cross confirmed (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) was a patient in the past and registered as a United States citizen. Medical staff also advised CBP that the child was critically ill (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) and needed to be transported to Tucson Medical Center for further medical treatment.

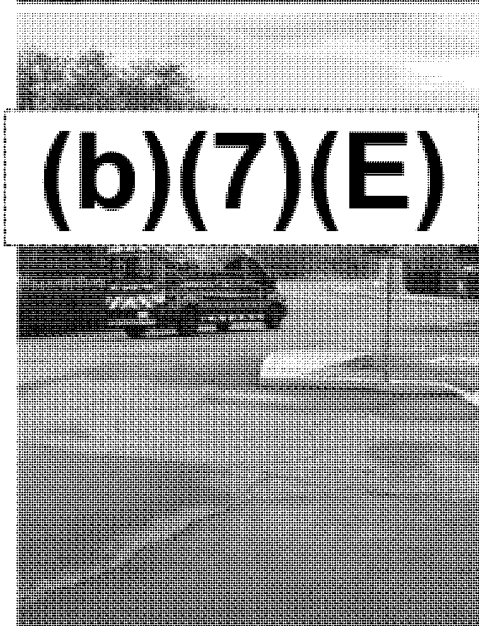
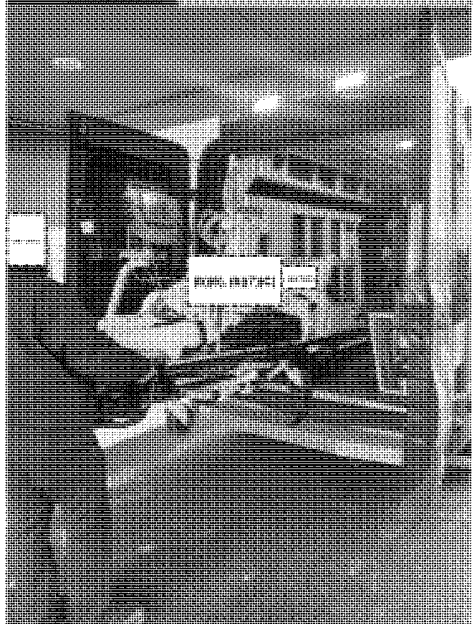

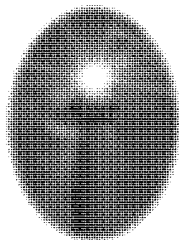

In December 2022, guidance was issued regarding notification requirements whenever an individual with an approved travel authorization under Uniting for Ukraine (U4U) is processed for any disposition other than Ukrainian Humanitarian Parole (UHP) or an approved travel authorization under the DHS established parole process for Venezuela is processed for any disposition other than Venezuelan Humanitarian Parole (VHP) at a Port of Entry (POE).

On January 5, 2023, DHS announced parole processes similar to that established for Venezuela for nationals of Cuba, Haiti, and Nicaragua. These processes are collectively referred to as the parole processes for Cuba, Haiti, Nicaragua, and Venezuela (CHNV) or the Advance Travel Authorization (ATA) processes.

The same notification requirements previously established for U4U and the parole process for Venezuelans are now required whenever an individual with an approved travel authorization under the DHS established parole process for Cuba is processed for any disposition other than Cuban Humanitarian Parole (CHP), an individual with an approved travel authorization under the DHS established parole process for Haiti is processed for any disposition other than Haitian Humanitarian Parole (HHP), or an individual with an approved travel authorization under the DHS established parole process for Nicaragua is processed for any disposition other than Nicaraguan Humanitarian Parole (NHP) at a POE. Please advise locations within your area of responsibility regarding this need for notification and ensure that such notifications are made to Field Liaison at (b)(7)(E) @cbp.dhs.gov, SEAL at (b)(7)(E) @cbp.dhs.gov, and EPD at (b)(7)(E) @cbp.dhs.gov.

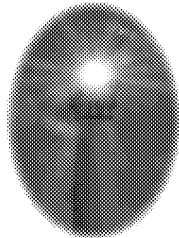

Hello,

FYA - OPA received the email below from (b)(6) National Security Correspondent for Immigration with BuzzFeed media. The topic is T42 and humanitarian paroles. Questions two, four and five specifically mentioned the DFO.

The attached is a December 9, 2021, letter from a law firm in Phoenix addressed to C1, DFO and Chief (b)(6), (b)(7)(C)

This story will be published this Thursday, 5 pm EST.

I am waiting on a call back from OPA (b)(6), (b)(7)(C) to discuss this further.

Perhaps OCC needs visibility as well.

I'm working on a story about immigrants in Nogales, Mexico who are trying to get humanitarian parole or a T42 exemption. Attorneys working in the Tucson sector said that compared to some other parts of the border they've had almost no success in getting an exemption or humanitarian parole. I spoke with a family who has a daughter who suffers from seizures and a gay couple who faces discrimination and danger in Nogales.

1. Attorneys working at the Nogales border said that up until last week all requests for humanitarian parole or Title 42 exemptions filed since August 2021 were either ignored or denied. Last week four were approved after attorneys said they would be going to members of Congress to push for the exemptions. Other parts of the border have had at least some success in getting humanitarian parole or T42 exemptions. Why are other parts of the border like Tijuana and South Texas having at least some success and Nogales isn't?
2. One denial didn't include a reason for why the applicant was denied humanitarian parole or T42 exemption. In a letter sent to Director of Field Operations Guadalupe Ramirez on Dec. 9, 2021, attorneys said that each denial must include a reason in order to determine if the denial was "facially legitimate and bona fide." Why are reasons for denial not given? Should all denials include a reason?
3. Advocates and attorneys are demanding that CBP issue and publicize written criteria to be used when officers consider a humanitarian parole request. I understand that each determination is made on a case-by-case basis, but why is there no guidance publicly posted for attorneys and immigrants without attorneys to determine if they qualify?
4. How long does a CBP director of field operations have to make a determination on a humanitarian parole request or denial?
5. The Dec. 9, 2021 letter to DFO Guadalupe Ramirez said that when attorneys asked for more information about why the petition was not approved they only received an email explaining that decisions were made on a case-by-case basis, no guidance was available to aid practitioners, and "current policy" is a factor in making parole determinations. How does current policy impact humanitarian parole requests and T42 exemptions?
6. As the Biden administration began to restart MPP, the DHS said that particularly vulnerable immigrants, including those with physical and mental health challenges, the elderly, and those at risk of discrimination because of their LGBTQ status, will be exempted from MPP on a case-by-case basis. Some of the same asylum-seekers in Nogales who are trying to be exempt from T42 would qualify for exemption under MPP. Why is it that immigrants who are deemed vulnerable under MPP enough to be exempt are not considered to be

vulnerable under T42 despite meeting the same criteria?

7. One of the families I'm writing about has a daughter who suffers from unexplained seizures. Part of the problem in getting exempt from T42 or receiving humanitarian parole is the medical proof immigrants and asylum-seekers are expected to provide. The family doesn't have a lot of money and haven't been able to get a diagnosis in Nogales, Mexico because they require a specialist they can't afford. Other times there are no specialists in the cities immigrants are from. Is there any consideration given to the medical limitations in Mexico or an immigrant's ability to pay for them when deciding whether to give someone an exemption or humanitarian parole?

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Hi,

I'm working on a story about immigrants in Nogales, Mexico who are trying to get humanitarian parole or a T42 exemption. Attorneys working in the Tucson sector said that compared to some other parts of the border they've had almost no success in getting an exemption or humanitarian parole. I spoke with a family who has a daughter who suffers from seizures and a gay couple who faces discrimination and danger in Nogales.

1. Attorneys working at the Nogales border said that up until last week all requests for humanitarian parole or Title 42 exemptions filed since August 2021 were either ignored or denied. Last week four were approved after attorneys said they would be going to members of Congress to push for the exemptions. Other parts of the border have had at least some success in getting humanitarian parole or T42 exemptions. Why are other parts of the border like Tijuana and South Texas having at least some success and Nogales isn't?

2. One denial didn't include a reason for why the applicant was denied humanitarian parole or T42 exemption. In a letter sent to Director of Field Operations Guadalupe Ramirez on Dec. 9, 2021, attorneys said that each denial must include a reason in order to determine if the denial was "facially legitimate and bona fide." Why are reasons for denial not given? Should all denials include a reason?

3. Advocates and attorneys are demanding that CBP issue and publicize written criteria to be used when officers consider a humanitarian parole request. I understand that each determination is made on a case-by-case basis, but why is there no guidance publicly posted for attorneys and immigrants without attorneys to determine if they qualify?

4. How long does a CBP director of field operations have to make a determination on a humanitarian parole request or denial?

5. The Dec. 9, 2021 letter to DFO Guadalupe Ramirez said that when attorneys asked for more information about why the petition was not approved they only received an email explaining that decisions were made on a case-by-case basis, no guidance was available to aid practitioners, and "current policy" is a factor in making parole determinations. How does current policy impact humanitarian parole requests and T42 exemptions?

6. As the Biden administration began to restart MPP, the DHS said that particularly vulnerable immigrants, including those with physical and mental health challenges, the elderly, and those at risk of discrimination because of their LGBTQ status, will be exempted from MPP on a case-by-case basis. Some of the same asylum-seekers in Nogales who are trying to be exempt from T42 would qualify for exemption under MPP. Why is it that immigrants who are deemed vulnerable under MPP enough to be exempt are not considered to be vulnerable under T42 despite meeting the same criteria?

7. One of the families I'm writing about has a daughter who suffers from unexplained seizures. Part of the problem in getting exempt from T42 or receiving humanitarian parole is the medical proof immigrants and asylum-seekers are expected to provide. The family doesn't have a lot of money and haven't been able to get a diagnosis in Nogales, Mexico because they require a specialist they can't afford. Other times there are no specialists in the cities immigrants are from. Is there any consideration given to the medical limitations in Mexico or an immigrant's ability to pay for them when deciding whether to give someone an exemption or humanitarian parole?

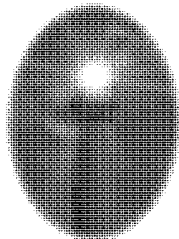

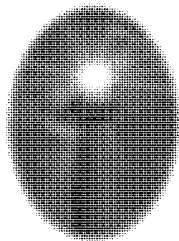

The family doesn't have a lot of money and haven't been able to get a diagnosis in Nogales, Mexico because they require a specialist they can't afford. Other times there are no specialists in the cities immigrants are from. Is there any consideration given to the medical limitations in Mexico or an immigrant's ability to pay for them when deciding whether to give someone an exemption or humanitarian parole?
